Te kupu whakataki | Introduction

As a new public servant it is often hard to make sense of how the public sector is structured, and how all the different parts fit together – or even what part of the 'public sector system' you and your organisation fit into.

The New Zealand Public Service groups itself around clusters of agencies that work together towards similar outcomes. These clusters are often referred to as 'sectors'.

The purpose of this conversation guide is to support you as a new public servant to learn about how your organisation fits into the public sector and works together with other agencies to achieve outcomes for New Zealanders.

Ko tā tēnei puka | How this guide works

Often the best way to learn is through conversations with others, especially when it comes to finding out about your specific organisation.

We encourage you to have a conversation with your manager, or someone in your organisation who is an experienced public servant about how your organisation fits into the wider public sector context.

We've given you some prompts to get you started on pages 3 and 4, but we're sure you'll find lots of interesting information that will help you in your role.

You will also find in the appendix at the end of this guide a breakdown of the sectors in the public service, and an overall view of how the public sector is made up.

The New Zealand Public Service is organised around clusters of agencies that work together towards similar outcomes. These sectors as outlined below are a part of the public service, not public sector. The public service is a part of the wider public sector. - Border: The Public Service border sector works together to protect our people, economy and environment. They do this by preventing harmful pests, diseases and illicit goods such as drugs from entering Aotearoa New Zealand
